Amendment 15	♦ Legalizing African American Suffrage (Right to Vote) (Ratified 1870)
"FREE CITIZENS VOTE!!"	♦ Amendments 13, 14, & 15 are known as the "Civil War Amendments" FREE: Abolition of Slavery (13) CITIZENS: Citizenship (14) VOTE: Suffrage/Right to Vote (15)
Amendment 19	♦ Legalizing Women's Suffrage (Ratified 1920)
Amendment 22	♦ Presidential Term Limits (Ratified 1951)
Amendment 26	♦ Suffrage for Citizens 18 Years of Age or Older (Ratified 1971)
