Comanche arrive in Texas

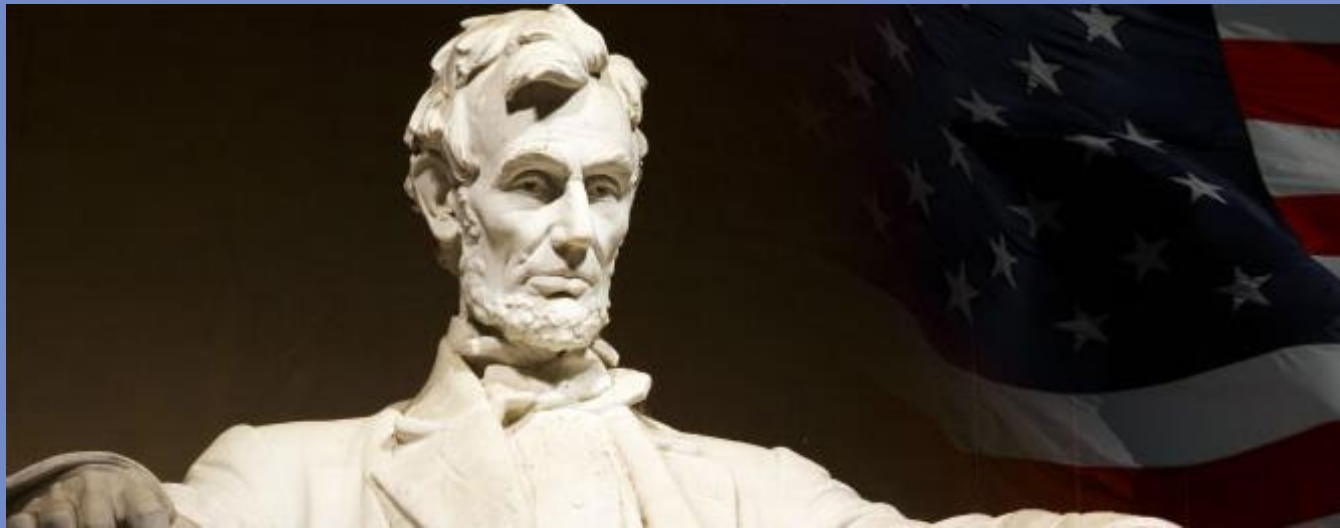
1859 to 1880s
