




March 6, 1836 | Dawn at The Alamo: The final Mexican assault




Davy Crockett and his Tennessee volunteers defend The Alamo







#### **Public Treaty**

War ended Mexican army pulled south of the Rio Grande Mexico promises never to attack Texas again Prisoners released from both sides



#### **Secret Treaty**

Texas never to be invaded again Mexico to recognize that Texas was independent Mexico to make a trade agreement with Texas Rio Grande to serve as the border between the two countries Once all those promises are kept, Santa Anna to be released
