Britain and France compete for rich farmlands in Ohio River Valley	French and	French power ends in North America
France determined to stop British westward expansion	Indian War	No settlements west of Appalachians (<u>Proclamation of 1763</u>)
Britain and France involved in worldwide struggle for power	1754–1763	Britain left with a large war debt
Britain had a large debt after the French and Indian War Placing soldiers in frontier and colonies costs money colonists should pay	Stamp Act 1765	Colonists angrily protest about " <u>no taxation without representation</u> " (no reps. in Parliament) Boycott of British goods proves successful—this tax repealed in 1766
Parliament still had to deal with a large debt Some in Parliament (Grenville) thought the treasury official (Townshend) was afraid to tax Americans	Townshend Acts 1767	Protests over <u>writs of assistance</u> as violating their rights as British citizens More boycotts of taxed British goods <u>Sons of Liberty</u> formed to organize protests
Colonists angry at excessive taxes and <u>Quartering Act</u> (forced to house soldiers in homes) Many soldiers in Boston a daily reminder of Britain's unjust taxes and limits on rights	Boston Massacre 1770	Samuel Adams forms a <u>Committee of Correspondence</u> Most of the Townshend Acts and the Quartering Act were repealed (tax on tea maintained)
<u>Tea Act</u> forced colonists to buy cheap British tea American merchants angry at being cut out of tea trade Americans boycott only British tea	Boston Tea Party 1773	Intolerable Acts passed by Parliament to punish Boston/MA <u>First Continental Congress</u> meets— boycott all British goods/stop exports to Britain and set up colonial <u>militias</u>
Buildup of colonial militias and British troops in Boston British secretly plan to capture militia arms and leaders at Concord Sons of Liberty learn of plan/ <u>Paul Revere</u> rides to warn towns	Lexington and Concord 1775	British forced to retreat back to Boston Over 10,000 militia rush to Boston and surround the city/British troops Beginning of the American Revolution
