Age of Exploration	1492-1607	Exploration of North America (Columbus, early European explorers)
Colonial America	1607-1763	Founding of Jamestown; growth of representative government; economic development of colonial regions; beginnings of slavery and plantation system; growth of the slave trade
Revolution and Independence	1763-1787	British mercantilist system; desire for representation and a limited government (taxes); Declaration of Independence; causes of American Revolution; key battles and figures of the war; Articles of Confederation
Constitution and Bill of Rights	1787-1790	Constitutional Convention and key compromises; beginning of political parties with the ideas of Federalists and Anti-Federalists; American beliefs and principles reflected in the Constitution; influence of historic documents on the Constitution
New Republic	1787-1828	Challenges of the new republic including events/issues during the administrations of Washington, Adams, Jefferson, Madison, and Monroe; development and growth of political parties; origin and growth of free enterprise; political, economic, and social issues/events (<i>Marbury v. Madison</i>)(Second Great Awakening)
Industrial Revolution and Reforms	1793-1850	Introduction of modern technology and factory system; causes and effects of economic differences among different regions, including growing sectionalism; major reform movements and key individuals throughout the 19th century [Slater-to-Bessemer]
Age of Jackson	1828-1840	Emergence of states' rights; U.S. relationship with Native Americans (Trail of Tears); beginnings of the modern Democratic Party
Westward Expansion	1803-1853	Manifest Destiny; impact of westward expansion on economic, political, and social growth; geographic influences on settlement and economic activities; impact of technology on westward expansion; territorial acquisitions of the 19th century [Purchase-to-Purchase (LA-to-Gadsden)]
Civil War	1850-1865	Political, social, and economic causes of the growth of sectionalism and the Civil War, key battles and figures from the war
Reconstruction	1865-1877	Goals of various Reconstruction plans, postwar problems for North and South, challenges for African Americans, Civil War Amendments (13 14 15), challenges in rebuilding the South
