## Ancient Greece defined

# democracy

as "government by the people."

#### The Lessons of Rome's Republic

Create a <u>republic</u>, a government in which citizens rule themselves through elected representatives.

Follow the <u>Roman Republic</u> example—emphasize the virtues of independence and <u>public service</u>.

## The WARNINGS of Rome's Empire

Heed the warning from the <u>fall</u> of the <u>Roman Empire</u>—produce <u>educated and dedicated</u> <u>citizens</u> who honor independence and public service.

#### **Britain's Traditions of Freedoms**

## Magna Carta (1215)—stated that the English monarchs had to obey the law, and that citizens had basic rights to private propert and to a trial by jury.

#### **Britain's Traditions of Freedoms**

## English Bill of Rights (1689) increased rights of Englishmen to include regular elections of Parliament and the right to bear arms.

#### **Britain's Traditions of Freedoms**

# Habeas corpus—from the English Bill of Rights, that no person can be held in prison without being charged with a crime.

**The American Experience** A long tradition of representative government beginning with the Virginia House of Burgesses (1619), and a history of written documents that clearly define the powers and limits of government, including the Mayflower Compact (1620) and the written charters (constitutions) of each of the Thirteen Colonies.

## The American Experience

**Declaration of Independence (1776)** -the written grievances against the English king and to prevent such abuses in the new government. Familiarity with writing constitutions -including state constitutions and the Articles of Confederation (1777).





#### IN CONGRESS, JULY 4, 1776. Follow-the Paper Trail. BY THE REPRESENTATIVES OF THE TED STATES OF AMERICA.

#### GENERAL CONGRESS ASSEMBLED.

HEN in the Courfe of human Events, it becomes neceffary for one People to diffolve the Political Bands which have connected them with another, and to affume among the Powers of the Earth, the feparate and equal Station to which the Laws of Nature and of What address of entitle them, a decent Refpect to the Opinions of Mankind requires that they thould declare the caufes which impel them to the

He has abdicated Government here, by declaring us out of his Protection and waging War againflus,

He has plundered our Seas, ravaged our Coafts, burnt our Towns, and deftroyed the Lives of ourPeople. HE has planaeted out even heady heady begun with circumfunces of Cruelty and Perfidy, fearcely paralleled in the moft barbarous Agei, and totally unworky the Head of a civilized Nation.

He has configured out fellow Citizens taken Captive on the high Seas to bear Arms against their former, to become the Executioners of their Friends and - Llands



According to John Locke, all people had natural rights to life, liberty, and property. (Property later changed by Jefferson to "pursuit of happiness" in the Declaration of Independence.)

Locke also believed that government is an **agreement** between the ruler and the ruled—to enforce the laws and protect the people.

### **Sohn Goese** English Philosopher (1632–1704)

### Baron de Montesquieu stressed the importance of the rule of law government's powers should be clearly defined and divided up.

### Montesquieu also suggested the <u>separation of powers</u> (found in our <u>three branches of government</u>) to prevent any one person or group from gaining too much power.
